Local Customs

- Dress modestly when visiting temples or government buildings; cover shoulders and knees
- Offer a slight bow with a smile when greeting locals. When giving or receiving, it's polite to use both hands.
- It's common to remove shoes when entering homes, boutiques, and small businesses.

- Hello: "Hello" or "Xin Chao" (sin chow)
- Thank You: "Cam on" (gahm uhn)
- Excuse Me/Sorry: "Xin loi" (sin loy)
- Yes / No: "Da" / "Khong" (yah/khom)
- Please: "Lam on" (lahm uhn)
- I want to go to: "Toi muon di den" (toy moon dee den...)
- Where is...?: "... o dau?" (... uh doh?)

- **How much?:** "Bao nhieu tien?" (bow new teen-en?)
- Too expensive! "Mac qua!" (mahk waah!)
- Can you lower the price? "Giam gia duoc khong?" (yahm yah duke khom?
- Goodbye: "Tam biet" (tam bee-et)

TRAVEL ETIQUETTE

Cash is King

In smaller shops, markets, and rural areas, cash is preferred over credit cards. Carry enough Vietnamese Dong (VND) for most transaction. You can exchange currency when arriving at the airport or local banks.

Weather Preparedness

Vietnam has tropical climate, so pack light, breathable clothing, sunscreen, mosquito repellent spray, and stay hydrated.

Street Food

Vietnam's street food is delicious, but make sure to choose busy stalls that look clean and well-maintained to avoid foodborne illnesses. Tap water is not safe to drink, stick to bottled water.

Bargaining is Common

In local markets, haggling is expected. Don't hesitate to negotiate prices but always remain polite and friendly during the process.

Watch for Pickpockets and Snatchers

As in many major tourist destinations, pickpocketing, purse and phone snatching can happen. Keep your valuables secure and be aware of your surroundings, avoid wearing flashy jewelry.

Tipping

Tipping isn't mandatory in Vietnam, but it's a nice way to reward good services and is always appreciated. Tipping is expected at spas, for hotel porters, and tour guides. Tipping is recommended for food delivery, taxis and high-end restaurants. You can simply round up the bill or leave \$1 or \$2.

TOP THINGS TO DO

Ho Chi Minh city offers a wide range of activities catering to all types of travelers. Whether you're into history, culture, food, shopping or outdoor activities, the city has something for everyone:

- 1. RIDE LIKE A LOCAL Experience the city's energy up close by hopping on the back of a motorbike, just like the locals do. Evening motorbike tours offer a thrilling way to take in the sights, sounds, and street vendors that bring Ho Chi Minh City to life after dark..
- 2. JOIN THE LOCALS ON THE SIDEWALKS: The most authentic food is served on the sidewalk. Don't miss highlights such as bánh mì, southern-style savory pancakes (bánh xèo) and broken rice (com tấm).
- 3. CULTURAL & HISTORICAL EXPLORATION: Dive into Vietnam's rich history with visits to the War Remnants Museum, which offers a sobering look at the Vietnam War, and the Reunification Palace, a symbol of the end of the war. For a spiritual experience, visit Jade Emperor Pagoda, Thien Hau Temple or the Notre-Dame Cathedral.
- 4. VISIT THE CHINESE QUARTER: The Chinese neighborhood known as Chợ Lớn offers a vibrant experience from bustling markets, historic temples to delicious Cantonese cuisine.
- **5. HAIR WASHING:** In Vietnam, hair washing (gội đầu) is a spa-like treatment that includes a thorough hair wash, scalp massage, facial, and neck and shoulder relaxation-or even a full-body massage. And it's incredibly affordable for everything you get. Perfect after a long flight, or a long day of exploring and if you want to try it, check out **The Privé Spa!**
- **6. OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES:** Take a day trip to the Cu Chi Tunnels, an underground network used during the war or visit the Mekong Delta for a boat tour through lush landscapes and traditional villages. Binh Quoi Village offers a glimpse into rural Vietnamese life, with beautiful gardens and lakes.
- **7. WATER SPORTS:** While Ho Chi Minh City is not coastal, you can still enjoy boat rides on the Saigon River or take day trips to nearby beaches like Vung Tau for water sports, swimming, and relaxation by the sea.


CONTACT & TIPS

Do go with the flow

If minor inconveniences easily frustrate you, you might struggle to enjoy your time here. Flexibility is key-laugh things off and adapt. Schedules shift, queuing is almost nonexistent, and the city's noise and traffic can be overwhelming. Take a deep breath and let the small stuff slide. You trip will be so much better for it.

Do feel safe

While petty theft can occur in Vietnamese cities, the country as a whole is incredibly safe. Vietnamese people are generally kind and helpful-especially in the south, where they are the friendliest, most accommodating, and forgiving. You might even find, as I did, that you feel safer in Vietnam than in many Western countries.
